The Role

We are seeking to hire a Post-Doctoral Research Associate with expertise in conducting survey research in social and political psychology for a project focussing on the antecedents and consequences of political attitudes. The post is funded by a 5-year European Research Council Starting Grant awarded to Dr Nikhil Sengupta, titled “The psychology of public policy: Inequality, immigration and international relations (PSYPOL)”.

The successful candidate will work with Dr Sengupta at the School of Psychology, University of Kent, UK, alongside a full-time project administrator, several graduate students and research assistants. Key responsibilities include data analysis, dissemination of findings in the form of conference presentations and publications in academic journals, as well as assisting with survey design, data collection, data management, and the organisational aspects of the project (e.g., co-ordinating the work of research assistants). It is expected that the successful applicant will be highly familiar with major theories and research in political psychology, and will have extensive experience with quantitative research methods (in particular, multilevel and longitudinal modelling). Additionally, familiarity with experiments, experience sampling, and network analysis, as well experience in applying multiple methods to a given research question are desirable.

The project involves two largescale data collection initiatives – a four-wave longitudinal survey of 50,000 adults and an eight-wave longitudinal survey of 20,000 adolescents. The adult survey will also involve the use of a custom app that will enable the sample to serve as a participant pool for nested experimental and experience sampling designs. The adolescent survey will



include full network information for each participant, allowing for the application of network analysis. Each survey will be fairly extensive, allowing for the inclusion of a very wide range of constructs relevant to the projects objectives (see below). The “political attitudes” referred to in this project centre around policy preferences in the domains of inequality, immigration and international relations, but are not confined solely to these domains, nor restricted solely to policy preferences (e.g., broader attitudes such as partisanship, xenophobia, ideology, and values will also be examined). The project main objectives are described in brief below:

Objective 1: social antecedents of political attitudes. This focusses on the effects of peers, norms and social identity in the development of political attitudes in adolescence and adulthood. It will also consider the effects of media exposure and political communication in shaping political attitudes. This objective will primarily use data from the adult panel study, nested experiencing sampling data, and network data from the adolescent study.

Objective 2: cognitive antecedents of political attitudes. This focusses on the effects of cognitive biases and heuristics in shaping political attitudes. Data for this part of the project will be drawn primarily from the adult panel study and the nested experiments.

Objective 3: motivational antecedents of political attitudes. This focusses on the effects of basic human needs, motives and dispositions in shaping political attitudes. Data for this part of the project will be drawn from the adult panel study, nested experiments, and adolescent network study.

Objective 4: individual consequences of political attitudes. This focusses on the effects of political attitudes on people’s political behaviour (e.g., voting or protest intentions) and well as their wellbeing and psychological adjustment. Data from both the adult and adolescent samples are relevant to this objective.

Objective 5: structural consequences of political attitudes. This focusses on the effects of individual-level political attitudes on structural outcomes such as policy change, election results, demographic or regional change etc. Data from the adult survey will be used for this objective.

The successful candidate will leverage the largescale data generated by this project to advance the project’s objectives as well as their own research interests. Given the broad scope of the research questions above, a wide range of topics in social, political, cognitive and developmental psychology can be investigated under the purview of the project. The post holder will thus be helping to set up a rich database that will generate scientific insights for many years to come, and will have ongoing access to this database to support their own research plans.
